Hannah

annah, a 2.5 year old, came to Ironwood with her sister Meg in August of 2020. Their owner was scheduled for surgery and would be unable to care for them. A month later, Hannah began squinting her eyes, blinking frequently and having drainage. At the first of seven visits to the vet clinic, she was diagnosed with an ulcer on her eye. The upper lid was stitched back so that her



lashes wouldn't irritate it. We were told to continue the eye ointment we had been using for her. During her next checkup, the sutures were removed and the ulcer was gone.

A few weeks later Hannah was once again squinting and blinking in pain. Another trip to the vet proved that the ulcer was back along with conjunctivitis. Another stitch was put in the upper lid in hopes that it would create a scar that would hold the lid higher to keep her lashes off the eye. After little improvement an appointment was made with an



eye specialist who determined that Hannah needed entropion surgery but said she needed to lose weight first because her heavy brow was pushing her lids down which in turn, pushed the lashes inward. As a temporary solution, both eyes were sutured partially closed at the outer corners, just enough to keep the lashes off the eye. The daily eye ointment continued. A month later Hannah and Meg went to the clinic to be spayed. It turned out Hannah was starting her heat cycle, so that had to be postponed. While there the vet redid the sutures in both eyes. She felt that weight was not an issue and got entropion Hannah's surgery scheduled two weeks out. That



procedure went very well although her right eye still had an ulcer. She was also able to get spayed that day.

In early December Hannah went back for a checkup and had her stitches removed. Her eyes looked great and there was no further need for the daily ointment. She may need more tissue removed in the future but all is well for now. Hannah's evesight is not perfect. She still bumps into things at times, but her eyes are open and no longer irritated or painful. She is a happy gal and loves going out into the yard to explore with her sister Meg.
